School Hours

8.35 am – Our doors open and the children are welcomed in by a member of staff.

3:15 pm — School closes. Parents can collect their children from the playground.

Breakfast Club and After-School Provision

We provide a before and after school club on site.

Breakfast Club runs from 7:30am, and after-school care is available until 5:30pm. Please feel free to visit to discuss your needs with staff.



School Meals and Snacks

Children in Key Stage 1 are provided with a free hot lunch, or you can send your child with a packed lunch.

Parents can order their child's lunch at home, as you know what your child likes. This is done via the Arbor App. There are 4 healthy options every day including a sandwich option. School meals for children in Years 3-6 are chargeable per meal, or you can send your child with a packed lunch. School meals can be ordered by the child on the day or by the parent via the Arbor App.

Free School Meals

Milk

Children under five years old are entitled free milk. Parents need to order it via www.coolmilk.com. Milk can be purchatchildren over five.

Fruit and snacks

All children have access to free fruit and vegetable snacks at break-times. You are very welcome to send your child in with a fresh fruit or vegetable snack from home.

Jewellerv

For health and safety reasons, we do not allow children to wear jewellery in our school. The exceptions to this rule are one small plain earring studs in pierced ears, and small objects of religious significance, such as a crucifix on a chain. We ask that children either remove these objects or cover them with a plaster during PE lessons.

Enriched Curriculum

We offer a wide range of sports activities beyond the statutory PE Curriculum. Children are able to join clubs and teams to develop their physical skills. In school, we have sport coaches who offer a wide range of clubs during lunch times and after school. Skills and techniques are developed to enable children to participate in a wide range of sports.



We have valued links with our local community and regularly welcome visitors to the school. Visitors have a valuable role to play and contribute to many aspects of school life. They can deliver talks, workshops and full day activities across a wide range of subjects, giving children access to outside experiences and expertise. Inclusion

We promote equal opportunities for all. As a school, we strongly oppose racism and discrimination in any form. Our policies promote inclusivity, ensuring that we all work together to promote a deep understanding of the rich diversity of cultures in today's society. Please inform us if you, or your child, has a disability which may make access to any part of the school or curriculum difficult, so we can ensure all reasonable adjustments are made.

Special Educational Needs

As a school, we work hard to ensure that children with SEND have access to a fully inclusive curriculum and can take part in all activities. We pride ourselves in our communication with parents and will always consult, should we feel that a child needs further support.

If you have any concerns of your own, please contact the SENDCo to discuss what support might help your child. Parents are encouraged to share their views and experiences to build a profile of need, alongside members of staff.

Children with SEND will received specific support linked closely to their area of need. The class teacher, the SEND coordinator and teaching assistants will support with working towards targets. Parents will be kept informed regularly.

ELSA

Effective pastoral care is based on respect, confidence and understanding between home and school. ELSA (Emotional Literacy Support Assistance can be accessed in school should your child have any emotional or social needs such as bereavement or self-esteem.

Monitor and Assess

We regularly monitor and assess a pupils to ensures that their individual needs are met and, when necessary, to seek the advice of external agencies including the Educational Psychology service, the Specialist Teaching Service, Autism Outreach and the Special Needs Assessment Service.

The SEND policy outlines how children with special needs are identified, assessed and supported according their individual needs. We work of with parents, discussing support and providing regular feedback, are consulted should any extern agencies need to be contacted.



Griffydam's behaviour policy encourages children to take ownership of their rights and responsibilities within the school environment, ensuring that behaviour is consistent and encouraging self-regulation.

Our expectation is that all pupils treat everyone with respect and kindness, and this is evident for all visitors to see. Pupils are encouraged to show a sense of responsibility for their own and other people's possessions and for the health and safety of everyone.

There is a consistent approach across the school so that everyone is aware of our acceptable standard of behaviour. This is underpinned by the positive and fair attitudes of the staff. Initial issues are dealt with by the class teacher. Further issues will incur reflection time, following this, the Headteacher becomes involved. At this point, clear expectations are discussed with the child and parents. It is important to us that parents are kept informed if their child is struggling with behaviour at school.






We work closely with families to ensure all children are successful in line with our behaviour policy. This is important because home is where children's behavioural expectations are established; where adults expect their child to follow simple rules for safety and to carry out simple instructions. Consistency between home and school ensures that children accept the boundaries within school. We ask parents and children to sign a Home-School Agreement, to ensure that we all have a clear understanding of expectations in school, with full support from home.

Applications

At Griffydam, we follow Leicestershire Authority's Common Admissions Policy. Griffydam School admits children to the Foundation Stage at the beginning of the Autumn Term, once they reach the age of four.

After this initial visit, parents need to apply to the Local Authority (LA) for a place at the school. You do not need to live in the catchment area to get a place at Griffydam School.

Once a place has been allocated through the LA, the school will make arrangements for some introductory visits for the child, during the summer term preceding their entry.
